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### REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES for the Year Ended 31 March 2025

The trustees present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2025. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

#### **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

#### Objectives and aims

As laid out in our North West Aberdeenshire Citizens Advice Bureau Constitution (revised on the 23rd June 2025)

The organisation has been formed to benefit principally the area of North Aberdeenshire (the "Area of Benefit") with the following purposes:

- •the advancement of education through (but not limited to) providing individuals with information, clarification and understanding of legislation and their legal rights and responsibilities.
- •the relief of those in need through (but not limited to) (i) assessing individuals' entitlement to welfare benefits; (ii) providing assistance in claiming benefits; and (iii) assisting individuals to appeal against refusal of benefits.
- •the advancement of health through (but not limited to) providing a comprehensive advice service which seeks to address individuals' problems and thereby alleviates the injury to health, stress and anxiety caused by unsolved problems; and
- •the advancement of community development through (but not limited to) recruiting, training and developing local citizens to be volunteers in and for the Bureau, who in turn assist Members of the public within the Area of Benefit, and in doing so contribute to the development of the Area of Benefit.'

(Constitution of North West Aberdeenshire Citizens Advice Bureau, revised 23 June 2025)

North West Aberdeenshire Citizens Advice bureau is committed to providing free, impartial, and confidential advice to the public in North Aberdeenshire. Their charitable purpose revolves around empowering individuals, strengthening communities, and ensuring everyone has access to the support they need to overcome life's challenges. They achieve this by offering practical advice, negotiating on behalf of clients, and even representing them in formal settings like tribunals.

#### Significant activities

Whatever an individual's concerns, we strive to point them in the right direction. North West Aberdeenshire Citizens Advice Bureau can advise and provide information on day-to-day issues, through detailed support and specialist topics. Our main Bureau is in the central North Aberdeenshire town of Turriff, but we also see people at our outreach offices and also offer support, sign posting and clinics at specific key community events and venues.

Our specialist advisers most commonly give expert advice on:

- •HELP TO CLAIM Our experienced advisers can help support individuals through benefit claims such as first time Universal Credit application.
- •WELFARE RIGHTS The Welfare Rights Service offers confidential advice and assistance to access benefit entitlement.
- •MONEY ADVICE A specialist debt team who offer a free, confidential debt advice service.
- •MONEY TALK PLUS ADVICE Delivers benefits and welfare rights advice up to level 2. Advisors have specialist debt and money knowledge including understanding of statutory remedies.
- •HOUSING North West Aberdeenshire are accredited in giving Type 1, 2 and 3 level of advice by the Scottish Nationals Standards for Information. This includes advising and supporting individuals to explore housing options, dealing with eviction or anti-social behaviour and support for individuals facing homelessness. They can also advise anyone renting from local authorities or private landlords; and those with issues regarding security of tenure, statutory rights, housing repairs and adaptations.
- •DEBT AND MONEY ADVICE SERVICE NWACAB can advise and assist members of the public who would benefit from a financial health check to help ensure they are receiving all the money they are entitled to and confirm they are not paying over the odds for services. There is also a specialist debt support service for clients with multiple debts; we support individuals to find suitable and sustainable options for managing their debts. The aim being to maximise their income and review expenditure, negotiate with creditors and explore options to take concerns forward through an agreed plan.
- •BENEFIT APPEAL HELP AND REPRESENTATION We provide specialist support with mandatory reconsideration and appeals, and if appropriate representation at benefit appeal tribunals.
- •PATIENT ADVICE The Patient Advice & Support Service (PASS) has been specially created to offer free, impartial and confidential advice to patients, their carers and families in Scotland. When needed our advisers can provide feedback, raise concerns or complaints about the healthcare provided by NHS; and when applicable support individuals through the NHS complaints procedure.
- •PENSION WISE Free and impartial government guidance about your defined contribution pension options.

Lastly, a very important role of NWACAB is to collect data and knowledge of the real issues that are effecting our clients on a day-to-day basis, this allows us to work alongside other Scottish CABs and Citizens Advice Scotland (CAS) to change and develop social policy for the better of the people and develop a national database that can effectively pin point and support change in social policy.

### ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

#### Charitable activities

The Board of Trustees is indebted to all our staff and volunteers, both those on the frontline service who deliver advice and support and equally those who are behind the scenes charity ensuring the smooth and effective delivery of services. In this climate we could not be prouder of all those at NWACAB who continue to grow and improve the service; they have continued to deliver despite a lack of respite for our community from the cost-of-living crisis and cuts to health and public services. Through sheer determination and the hard work of our staff, volunteers and partners we continue to deliver a high quality and much-needed service to the people of North Aberdeenshire, while also affecting national social policy change.

This year has seen yet further rise in the public need for our services, our main office in Turriff, sub office Macduff and Outreach centres in Inverurie, Aberchirder and Huntly have been extremely busy. We have also seen an increase in requests for home visits to those who live in rural communities who often isolated by the high cost of transport and severe cuts to public transport.

The changes in social security benefits continue to impact on our clients and account for a high percentage of our workload; the support given in this area has increased year on year. A holistic approach is taken in client meetings; advisers check more than just what is presented and take a whole person approach to maximize the opportunity of identifying all areas of life and applying knowledge and support to enhance individual's lifestyle as fully as possible.

The NWACAB team and our Chief Officer have spent a great deal of time forging close ties with essential partners within the community. These include a parish church that provides a low-cost meeting space for clients within an office local to them; covering such a large geographical area with poor public transport means these sub offices are essential to client accessibility. The Forglen and St Ninians church through the Taylor Bequest Fund have also been giving our Advisers access to funding that is primarily used to purchase food vouchers, and to provide assistance with travel costs to enable attendance at DWP appointments. As always, we continue to work closely with local food banks and a partnership with the SPCA means we can also help those in crisis to feed and care for their pets. Lastly, we continue to take up opportunities at various local events, promoting the work done and support offered by the Bureau, while raising much-needed funds to support our day-to-day operations.

In 2022-23 our CAB along with other Scottish CABs within the CAS umbrella collected data and knowledge of real-life debt and mental health concerns into a Mental Health Moratorium Consultation. In 2024 the news came through that this had directly fed in and effectively changed social policy by supporting the Government's proposal of introducing a bespoke Mental Health Moratorium Form through powers contained in the Bankruptcy and Diligence (Scotland) Bill. As a board we are extremely proud of our team, particularly when they continue to feed into this consultation when so many other pressures are on their time, their determination effectively changed social policy for the better and is a brilliant example of the extraordinary work that CABs and CAS are doing that is improving people's lives and upholding their rights.

### FINANCIAL REVIEW

#### Reserves policy

The balance on our Reserve Account is currently required to provide for 3 months of expected running costs plus and any unexpected costs for example redundancy. The Reserve account remains at the correct level.

#### **FUTURE PLANS**

NWACAB will continue into 2025/26 the good work achieved in 2024/25, but with an emphasis on reaching out to areas in our constituency that are less catered for or geographically isolated. We will continue to take every chance possible to support the assessment and development of social policy.

We plan an emphasis on continuing to foster partnerships with other groups, agencies, authorities, charities and individuals; 2024/25 showed us what a massive asset partnership working makes to improving the quality and provision of services to our community.

### STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

#### **Governing document**

The charity is controlled by its governing document, a deed of trust and constitutes an unincorporated charity.

North West Aberdeenshire Citizens Advice Bureau (NWACAB) is a Scottish Charitable Incorporated Organisation (SCIO). The Bureau is an independent organisation with an individual board of trustees who are based in the community of North Aberdeenshire with the chief purpose to engage the community in the running of the local CAB through membership of a volunteer board of directors, open annual AGMs and public events.

Primarily NWACAB operates under a constitution that outlines its core principles and aims. These include providing free, confidential, impartial, and independent advice, as well as empowering individuals and influencing positive social change. The constitution emphasises on accessibility, effectiveness, and community accountability.

The general structure of the organisation consists of:

•the MEMBERS - who have the right to attend Member's meetings (including any annual general meeting) and have important powers under the constitution; in particular, the Members appoint people to serve on the Board and take decisions on changes to the constitution itself;

•the BOARD - who hold regular meetings, and generally control the activities of the organisation; for example, the Board is responsible for monitoring and controlling the financial position of the organisation.

•the people serving on the Board are referred to in the constitution as CHARITY TRUSTEES.

Importantly, NWACAB is also a member of the Citizens Advice Scotland (CAS) and as such, are bound by their principles and conditions of that membership. CAS chiefly supports the Citizens Advice network in Scotland by providing resources, training, and policy influence to help them deliver advice services. CAS also offers direct advice services to the public, handles consumer complaints, and engages in policy work based on the advice needs of the Scottish population.

The Chief Officer (CO) continues to record and develop our Health and Safety Policy; but ultimately it is the responsibility of the Board of Trustees to ensure these policies are up to date and regular risk assessments and procedures are carried out and followed. Also, appropriate systems and procedures, such as the Finance Policy and Procedures and funding strategies, are reviewed regularly throughout the year to ensure the mitigation of financial risks that the charity may face. The Board meets regularly to support our CO who is responsible for the day- to-day management of a significant number of staff and volunteers. At these meetings there is a routine review of the direction and on-going needs of NWACAB, as well as discussion of any significant concerns that the CO has and needs board backing resolve. One of the most important roles of the Board Trustees is to support the Chief Officer to meet the ever- increasing public demands.

NWACAB had a 5-year contract for the Aberdeenshire consortium, that was extended in 2024 for a further year, this is to provide money advice, outreach and admin staff and supervisors. This funding is from Aberdeenshire Council and is the main funding for NWACAB and an important source of funding that allows it to continue to operate. With this funding comes clear structure and outcomes that need to be met, with regular reports sent to all involved.

### Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

In line with the Constitution, Charitable Trustees of NWACAB are responsible for sourcing new members when required. The Board endeavours to maintain a level of diversity that truly represents its beneficiaries and Trustees are sought from a wide demographic across the large rural geographical area of North Aberdeenshire. Prospective trustees complete an application form and process, before being co-opted if the Board agrees. All new board members must attend an induction training session delivered by Citizens Advice Scotland and further online training with CASlearn so they can acquaint themselves with the work of the organisation; then on-going training is provided as required throughout the duration of their role as a Board Trustee.

Membership is (subject to clause 13) open to any person aged 16 years or over who:

- · lives, works or otherwise has an interest in the Area of Benefit; and
- supports the purposes and activities of the organisation.
- Employees of the organisation are not eligible for Membership; a person who becomes an employee of the organisation after admission to Membership shall automatically cease to be a Member.
- At any given time, no more than 25% of the Membership of the organisation may be volunteers working at the Bureau. (Constitution of North West Aberdeenshire Citizens Advice Bureau, revised 23 June 2025)

#### Independent examiner's report to the trustees of North West Aberdeenshire Citizen Advice Bureau SCIO

### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS for the Year Ended 31 March 2025

#### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charity, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Charities Act 2011. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

#### Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

#### Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

#### Taxation

The charity is exempt from tax on its charitable activities.

#### Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.
